Links	<ul> <li>Use web standard blue color with underline</li> <li>Use descriptive text (eg Multicultural Newsletter)</li> <li>Left justify lists, including links</li> <li>Bring up a new window when linking to a PDF or a non-COCC web page.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Using a different color for links</li> <li>Underlining text that is not a link</li> <li>Using <u>click here</u></li> <li>Centering link text</li> </ul>
Color	<ul> <li>Use black or dark grey text on a light background</li> <li>Highlight important items using bold or italics rather than color</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Colors that are difficult for color-blind viewers to distinguish (red/green)</li> <li>Highlighted text</li> </ul>
Writing	<ul> <li>Write content relevant to your audience</li> <li>Put main content points at the beginning (Inverted pyramid)</li> <li>Use clear concise headlines and headings to organize content</li> <li>Keep sentences/content short, omit unnecessary words</li> <li>Write in plain text, avoid marketing speak or jargon</li> <li>Use bullet points, lists, or tables</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Writing in all caps</li> <li>Blah, blah, blah text</li> <li>Wall of words</li> </ul>
