#### PREPAREDNESS AND POLICIES → Read this thoroughly!

- 1. Many labs will occur outdoors being appropriately prepared for lab is an expectation. This means being adequately dressed for the conditions, and having any required equipment indicated by the instructor. - 2. Attendance and missing labs and quizzes: Effective learning in this course is heavily dependent on your presence in class. You are expected to attend both lab and lecture. #### **CLASS AND LAB ASSIGNMENTS**

#### 1. Weekly Online Quizzes

You will do brief weekly quizzes to prepare you for what we cover in class each week. The quizzes will cover material from the readings (textbook or posted readings on Blackboard) Quizzes will be posted a week in advance –complete these by Monday morning before class so you know the material for the current week!

#### 2. Field Trip Report

The field trip report will constitute ~20% of your grade. It entails collecting information or data during all of our different field trip stops and then presenting that information in a concise but thorough report that gives the reader (me) a clear understanding of what you accomplished and learned. An outline/rubric for this report will be posted/distributed before the field trip.

#### 3. Article reviews

The Article Review assignment is to give you experience reading and interpreting peer-reviewed articles in science journals.

Select a peer-reviewed science article from the list below, or from online journals accessed through the Barber Library. Articles should be from within the last 5 years.

Read the article. Abstract, Introduction, Results, Conclusions, and Discussions are all separate sections of the article that will give you specific information on how to complete the five sections of this assignment. When you are ready to complete this assignment, answer the following five sections. Be concise with your explanation to each part. There are no maximum or minimum word counts for each section; just thoroughly address each section. Your article review must be typed, double-spaced, and in 11-12-point font with a heading including your name, date, course number (i.e. FOR111), and assignment name. Include the following 5 sections as subheadings:

**Section 1:** Provide a reference for the article. Here is an example of the correct format for a journal article:

Hendee, J.C., and Randall, P. 1997. The growth of Environmental and Conservation-Related Organizations. *Renewable Natural Resources Journal*. Vol 10(2): pp. 6 – 19.

- **Section 2:** What is the question that this article is trying to answer? The Abstract and Introduction will help with this question.
- **Section 3:** How did the authors go about trying to answer their question? Methods, or Methodology will help answer this question.
- **Section 4:** What did the authors find? What were their results and conclusion? Results and Conclusions are sections that will help you answer this question.
- **Section 5:** What are the implications of this article: what does it mean for forestry (or wildlife or recreation etc)? Or, how will this research affect management in the area of study addressed in this article? You can also include any thoughts or impressions you had about the research, quality of the work, etc in this part.
