Course description: This course explores the identification, classification and distribution of shrubs, forbs, and grasses found in low, mid, and high elevation Oregon habitat types. Emphasis is placed upon proper field identification through use of terminology and taxonomic keys. We will also discuss sensitive plants and noxious weeds.

Learning Outcomes: Upon successful completion of the course, you will be able to:

- Accurately identify ~50 major indicator species of specific habitat types by common and scientific names.
- Properly identify and discuss sensitive plants and noxious weeds.
- Correctly prepare a plant collection (herbarium).

INSTRUCTOR POLICIES:

- 1. Basic attendance: Your time and energy in this course is critical don't miss class. If you are going to be late or miss a class, call me or email me prior to class.
- 2. <u>Professionalism</u>: Points acquired through professionalism include coming prepared to class with collection materials, textbooks, hard hats, appropriate clothing, and a positive attitude. - 6. Obtaining answers from another student will result in a grade of 0 for the activity. A second occurrence will result in a failing grade for the course.

Excessive absenteeism WILL affect your grade.
